



MAKING A DIFFERENCE

The Canadian welding industry is experiencing a shortage of welding professionals in several provinces and sectors, due in significant part to an aging Canadian population, a lack of young people being attracted to the skilled trades and the reduced focus on skilled trades training in secondary and post-secondary institutions. If this shortage is not quickly addressed, it may inevitably lead to a crisis in the industry and its ability to be globally competitive in the future. Over 100,000 Canadians are currently employed as certified welders across more than 6,300 certified organizations. Recent labour market surveys indicate strong growth for the welding and joining industry over the next decade and beyond. Shipbuilding, oil and gas, manufacturing and many other sectors are facing recruitment challenges—skills gaps and skills shortages—including a need to replace 20-30 per cent of their workforce through retirement over the next 10 years.

What is CWB Group doing?

- The CWB Group is protecting the safety of Canadians by ensuring that the welding work done on critical building and infrastructure projects conforms to Canadian codes and standards.
- Our for-profit businesses contribute 75% of the revenue to the CWB Welding Foundation. Work done by our Education, Registration and Consulting supports our Foundation to continue doing good in the Canadian welding industry.
- Enforcing safety in the welding industry means certified companies must continually demonstrate compliance with the requirements of the certification standard. This includes testing of new welders, retesting of existing welders, qualification of new welding procedures and ongoing verification of visual weld quality.
- Strengthening the industry through our education products. At the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the CWB Group offered free online courses to individuals and introduced a CWBi Acorn course curriculum to colleges and high schools across Canada.
- Providing knowledge and understanding our customers through industry events across Canada. The CWB Group hosts annual CanWeld and Educators Conferences to discuss issues around current trends, industry advancements, welding and joining, health and safety, and so much more. We also give back to the industry by hosting local Welding Industry Days in cities across Canada and online to discuss matters specific to our clients in the regions they live in.
- The CWB Welding Foundation is committed to forging partnerships between industry, education and government that enable Canadians to build great careers in the welding industry. With over \$16 million invested to date, the Foundation encourages all those interested in exploring future opportunities in the skilled trades and welding-related careers.

CWB CERTIFICATION

To support our clients during the COVID-19 quarantine, the CWB Certification team developed a new program to deliver virtual audits to our customers. This eliminated the need for in-person visits from our Certification Service Representatives and ensured the safety of both clients and staff. A new customer portal was developed to provide additional value and self-service to Certification clients. The myCWB portal allows customers exclusive access to all of their relevant data with the CWB Group. Additionally, the Certification team has transitioned to the 2019 version of the CSA W47.1 standard and supports our clients as they adopt the new version of the standard.

CWB EDUCATION

COVID-19 posed a great challenge for CWB Education, but the team was swift in responding to the crisis. Students were provided with the opportunity to transfer their courses online, plus many of the classes were offered free of charge to alleviate the stress posed by the pandemic and keep students ahead of the curve. With the launch of the first-ever Canadian hydrostatic testing program, 2019 ended on a high note for the team with increased engagement and sign-ups amongst students.

Additionally, the CWBi Acorn team has been extremely busy this past year in forging strategic partnerships

The highly experienced consulting team is offering its services to high schools across Canada to minimize the risk to students and instructors due to an increase in reporting welding-related injuries. The team will work with area high schools in providing detailed reports of equipment and non-conformances to ensure that all participants are working in a safe environment. Plus, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the consulting team has worked with companies to offer retained services through an online platform to keep business going as usual and has succeeded in securing their first international client.

CWB REGISTRATION

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Registration team responded quickly to our customer needs by hosting virtual audits with the promise of a detailed report on the same day. This was done to eliminate high travel costs for organizations while delivering the same high-quality service. Furthermore, CWB Registration is also accredited with SCC to provide registration to companies for ISO 45001. Because it enables organizations to put in an occupational health and safety management system, we expect registrations to rise significantly in the upcoming year. The team is also offering ISO 50001 services for the management of energy in any given business size.









Recent labour market surveys indicate strong growth for the welding and joining industry over the next decade and beyond. CWB EDUCATION

Welcome to Acorn - this is a new national initiative to provide standardized training, testing, assessment, credentials and recruiting at a national level. It can best be thought of as a flexible learning platform that can be easily adopted on its own, or adapted to fit within existing training initiatives.

It is intended to be national program with a prime goal of providing world-class training material and support programs in a fully uniform, transparent and accountable fashion. It will be centrally administered and managed through CWB Group's CWB Education on behalf of industry, educators and students who want to support the program.

To meet the growing demands for skilled trades workers and help reverse skilled labor shortage trends, Acorn has made a commitment to providing world class content for secondary schools across Canada.

CWB CERTIFICATION

The CWB Group certifies companies, inspection organizations, inspectors, and welding consumables through a review and qualification process to ensure that they meet the requirements for a variety of product and safety codes as well as standards such as CSA W47.1, CSA W47.2, CSA W55.3, CSA W186, CSA W178.1, CSA W178.2 and CSA W48.



In order to achieve and maintain certification, companies engaged in welding are required to have their personnel qualified for engineering, supervisory and welding activities, and follow approved welding procedures.

Similar to welding companies, welding inspection organizations are required to have their personnel qualified for supervisory and certified for inspection, whether it's visual, destructive or non-destructive testing.

Individuals looking to achieve certification as visual welding inspectors are required to meet the standard's experience requirements and successfully complete written and practical exams.

In Canada, a number of CSA product standards require welding fabricators to use welding consumables

certified in accordance to CSA W48. CSA W48 provides requirements for the classification and certification of welding consumables by themselves or in conjunction with gas mixtures or fluxes as applicable.

Stud manufacturers are also required to qualify their stud bases in accordance with CSA Standard W59 or other governing standard.

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
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
